Message from Part C's State Family Resource Coordinator, Information & Referral... Happy Independence Day!

Dear Parents/Families,

By seeking help from early intervention (EI) services for your child you were probably hoping to learn new information about your child and about how you could assist them in their overall development.

The goal of EI services is to give very young children (birth to 36 months) a good beginning in closing developmental gaps that may have occurred because of a diagnosed disability or "high-risk" condition in their young lives.

EI enhances their overall growth by supporting the development of skills that other kids their age typically acquire, and is also designed to support and teach the family effective ways to interact with their child and each other.

One might ask why so much emphasis is placed on EI if services are only available for a short few years.

Children do not stop learning once they turn three years of age, and current brain research suggests that there exists a "window of opportunity" while they are in their early years where neurological brain paths are still growing the most. Research shows that the earlier the intervention, the more we are able to close those developmental gaps.

Been There, Done That!

Originally from the Midwest, I moved to Las Vegas in 2014 where I currently reside with my partner, Kenny, and our 4-year old son, Lennon. Lennon has been diagnosed with severe autism, sensory processing disorder, suspected intellectual disability, and a suspected speech impairment. There are additional pieces to his personality that have me believe diagnosis of OCD and ADHD are in our future as well.



Lennon started with Nevada Early Intervention Services (NEIS) and is currently receiving ABA in-home services and in-clinic OT and SLP. After just a few weeks in the Clark County School District hybrid model of the KIDs Program, Lennon made it clear that school was somewhere he wanted to be. And while I'm absolutely terrified, he will be taking part when they switch to full-time, in-person this April. Over the last few months Lennon has made some amazing strides - he said his first word (apple) and started reciting his numbers (1-10). Of course now he randomly will just say "apple, apple, apple" or count to ten on repeat, but I just love hearing his voice.

We were fortunate in that we had a great team supporting us while at NEIS - from our Developmental Specialist to behavior technicians to SLPs and OTs - they ALL rallied around Lennon. But, as many of you know, even with all the support in the world the challenges that come are a lot.

And I know that while our experience was relatively smooth, I know that is not the case for many others. I'm active on many social media forums with families similar to mine who have children that require extra supports. Often these families have a lot of questions and find it incredibly challenging to navigate services. While there are many things I find myself well-versed in (like advocating for my son and being aware of what options for services are out there) there are others I find incredibly difficult (pretty much anything to do with insurance or financial assistance programs).

Additionally, I support the marketing efforts for two amazing organizations that provide services to this amazing community - Opportunity Village and Capability Health.

I'm so excited to be a part of Nevada's Early Intervention Interagency Coordinating Council (ICC) and hope that my voice on the Council will be a welcome, helpful and insightful one. Thank you" ~ Kristin Hoxie, ICC Parent Representative



FREE – National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands Access Pass.

This is a lifetime pass for U.S. citizens, permanent residents with permanent disabilities.

Documentation is required to obtain the pass. The pass in most cases provides free access to, and use of, Federal recreation sites that charge an Entrance fee. The pass admits the pass holder and passengers in a non-commercial vehicle at per vehicle fee areas, and pass holder + 3 adults, not to exceed 4 adults, at per person fee areas (children under 16 are admitted free). **The pass can only be obtained in person at the park or from a participating Federal recreation site or office.** For more information, visit,

Nevada's Early Intervention Interagency Coordinating Council (ICC) was established under federal law for the purpose of advising and assisting Nevada and its Early Intervention Services (serving children birth until three) in managing their responsibilities under Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

The FAMILY SUPPORT RESOURCE SUBCOMMITTEE Mission Statement:

The Nevada ICC's Family Support Resource Subcommittee will support ICC activities and ensure the ICC responds to issues important to families, strengthen and broaden family involvement at all policy and service levels, increase ICC communication with families, provide public awareness support, and identify and support efforts to improve early intervention services and programs within communities.

The FAMILY SUPPORT RESOURCE SUBCOMMITTEE Goals/Objectives include:

Developing and facilitating parent presentations to Early Intervention Programs, possible "Family Leadership Training for Families" with ICC Parent Representatives, ICC Family Support Resource Committee Members, Program Resource Parents, parent leaders and interested parents throughout the state. They would present their discussions and recommendations at ICC meetings.

Assisting in the development of ideas for new family support projects, which could be piloted in the state and whenever possible serve on other ICC subcommittees or task forces.

Planning and implementing strategies for recruiting, training, and supporting parents to assist with and participate in statewide activities, and policy development roles within the state.

What is the ICC?

The purpose of the ICC is to advise and assist Nevada and the Early Intervention system in developing, implementing, and promoting a program of family-centered early intervention services for all eligible infants, toddlers and their families. The Governor appoints all members of the ICC for a three year term.

Why is it important for parents like me to serve?

You know what it feels like to have a child with a disability. You know what it feels like to have early intervention professionals in your home, working with you and your child. You probably have opinions about what worked well and what could have worked better. Your perspective is very important. As the ICC works with the State to make program changes, family input is an integral part of the process.

What would I be asked to do?

- Attend the 4 general meetings of the Interagency Coordinating Council, each year.
 - Respond to email communications regarding the ICC
- Contribute information and your unique perspective regarding issues that impact Nevada early intervention programs

Would I be reimbursed for attending?

All parent members may receive a child care stipend for attending each of the 4 ICC meetings, as well as compensation and/or reimbursement of expenses for other meetings.


Am I eligible to apply?

Estimados padres/familias,

Al buscar ayuda de los servicios de intervención temprana (EI, por sus siglas en inglés) para su hijo, probablemente esperaba obtener nueva información sobre su hijo y sobre cómo podría ayudarlos en su desarrollo general.

El objetivo de los servicios de EI es dar a los niños muy pequeños (nacidos a los 36 meses) un buen comienzo en el cierre de las brechas de desarrollo que pueden haber ocurrido debido a una discapacidad diagnosticada o condición de "alto riesgo" en sus vidas jóvenes.

Ei mejora su crecimiento general al apoyar el desarrollo de habilidades que otros niños de su edad suelen adquirir, y también está diseñado para apoyar y enseñar a la familia maneras efectivas de interactuar con su hijo y entre sí.

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¡He estado ahí, hecho eso!

Originario del Medio Oeste, me mudé a Las Vegas en 2014, donde actualmente resido con mi pareja, Kenny, y nuestro hijo de 4 años, Lennon. Lennon ha sido diagnosticado con autismo severo, trastorno del procesamiento sensorial, sospecha de discapacidad intelectual y un presunto deterioro del habla. Hay piezas adicionales en su personalidad que me tienen creer que el diagnóstico de TOC y TDAH también están en nuestro futuro.



Lennon comenzó con Nevada Early Intervention Services (NEIS) y actualmente está recibiendo servicios en el hogar de ABA y OT y SLP en la clínica. Después de unas pocas semanas en el modelo híbrido del Distrito Escolar del Condado de Clark del Programa KIDs, Lennon dejó claro que la escuela estaba en algún lugar donde quería estar. Y aunque estoy absolutamente aterrorizado, él participará cuando cambien a tiempo completo, en persona este abril. En los últimos meses Lennon ha hecho algunos avances increíbles - dijo su primera palabra (manzana) y comenzó a recitar sus números (1-10). Por supuesto ahora sólo dirá "manzana, manzana, manzana" o contará hasta diez en repetición, pero me encanta escuchar su voz.

Tuvimos la suerte de que teníamos un gran equipo que nos apoyaba mientras estábamos en NEIS , desde nuestro especialista en desarrollo hasta técnicos de comportamiento, slps y OTs , todos se reunieron alrededor de Lennon. Pero, como muchos de ustedes saben, incluso con

todo el apoyo del mundo los desafíos que vienen son muchos. Y sé que si bien nuestra experiencia fue relativamente suave, sé que no es el caso de muchos otros. Estoy activo en muchos foros de redes sociales con familias similares a las mías que tienen hijos que requieren apoyos adicionales. A menudo estas familias tienen muchas preguntas y les resulta increíblemente difícil navegar por los servicios. Si bien hay muchas cosas en las que me encuentro bien versado (como abogar por mi hijo y ser consciente de qué opciones de servicios hay por ahí) hay otras que encuentro increíblemente difíciles (casi cualquier cosa que tenga que ver con los programas de seguro o asistencia financiera).


